The Voice of Faith

Many years ago, I had a life-changing experience. I already knew "all about Jesus," and was attending church regularly, serving on committees, doing my part. But I had a growing dissatisfaction with life. I started expecting some kind of change to come from God, if God really loved me, and I'm sure having that expectation helped a lot. When people don't expect good things from God, don't turn to God in times of trouble, to gain peace from God's love and power to save, (don't treat God as God), it's difficult to see God working or hear God speaking.

And that had been my problem up to then. But I went on a 3-day "Great Banquet" weekend, and there, God showed up, big time. It wasn't like a hologram or something. God "shows up" in and through God's people, doing what God does, loving each other. And I realized how self-focused I was, and how opposite from Jesus that is, and how blind and deaf I had been to God's presence and what God had been telling me all along.

So I made a deal with God (I was still in this arrogant humans-have-control mode, but God even worked with that). I confessed how blind and deaf I was, and promised to walk through the next door that opened, counting on God to control that door. Next thing I knew, I was being invited to take part in a prison ministry called Kairos. That was the last thing I expected, but a deal is a deal. So I went.

Kairos Prison Ministry is essentially a "Great Banquet" or "Walk to Emmaus" behind bars. And if I, who already knew (in my head) that God loved me, felt a tremendous impact of God's love (in my heart), imagine the impact on inmates of finding out that the God they thought hated them, actually loved them ("your Daddy wants you back").

Sharing the Gospel, through story and love (not theological argument), instead of being something to avoid (in fear of conflict), became a blessing, because of the positive impact it had on people. It became my drug, and I was addicted. I needed to share the Gospel in a way that still drives me. And here's the irony: that's all Jesus means when he says, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations ... teaching them to do what I have commanded you." (which is to love). Jesus calls ALL Christians (his disciples) to do this. And anyone who has ever felt good because of helping someone, has experienced God working through them. It's a blessing.

This experience also impacted me as I considered a call to professional ministry. But I still had a concern that, if I became a pastor, I would actually be less available to share the Gospel outside the congregation. My encouragement was that, since I had been brought along in this journey by church leaders, perhaps I could do the same for someone else. And these thoughts made it a priority for me to be sure to not let ministry TO the church get in the way of the ministry OF the church, to the world. And so, I am extremely busy outside of our congregation.

Recently, I had the opportunity to be part of Kairos Prison Ministry again, as it started up in Nebraska. We have completed the first weekend at Nebraska State Penitentiary, and now begins the business of building community, the Body of Christ, inside the prison. I appreciate the congregation's support, but I also challenge each of you, not to engage in prison ministry per se, but to find the means God HAS ALREADY given you for sharing the Gospel, and by which God wants to bless you in doing.

Walk to Emmaus is (unfortunately) known primarily as a weekend ministry, but that is not the point. The point is the community that forms and is intentional in supporting each other in the life to which God has called each of us. The Heartland Faithful Walk to Emmaus community, centered in Omaha, has weekends coming up later this year. It is a great opportunity to get to know God in a way you never have before, and explore God's calling. You are invited.

Kairos Prison Ministry International, Inc. The Kairos programs take the participants on a journey that demonstrates the love and forgiveness of Jesus Christ. By sharing the love and forgiveness of Jesus Christ, Kairos hopes to change hearts, transform lives and impact the world. Hearts are change, prisons are less violent, recidivism rates are reduced, and communities are safer.

VISION

A Community spiritually freed from the effects of imprisonment reaching all impacted by incarceration, through the love, hope, and faith found in Jesus Christ.

MISSION

The mission of the Kairos Prison Ministry is to share the transforming love and forgiveness of Jesus Christ to impact the hearts and lives of incarcerated men, women and youth, as well as their families, to become loving and productive citizens of their communities.

CORE VALUES

Kairos is a Lay led, Christ Centered Ministry. We are Christians who believe in the Holy Trinity and honor and live the teachings of the Bible and our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. We invite all to attend as Participants in Weekends and program-specific follow-up activities to build Christian Community. We empower Guests or Participants to be accountable for their lives and be transformed by Jesus Christ. We believe in the importance of enabling relationships to build community, thus our model includes the Weekend experience followed by Guests or Participants gathering regularly for accountability, support, and prayer. The full complement of the well-defined returning model is necessary for the community to prosper. We believe in respecting each person with dignity while modeling Christ's love. We practice 'Listen, Listen, Love, Love.'

Sharing God's Bounty

Giving Sacrificially



A husband and wife who were traveling around the world saw a boy in Korea one day pulling a crude plow in a field, while an old man held the plow handles and directed it through the rice paddy. The husband was amused by the sight and took a snapshot of the scene.

"That's very curious," he remarked to the missionary who was their interpreter and guide. "I suppose they are poor."

"Yes," said the missionary. "That is the family of Chi Noui. When the church was built they were eager to give something to it, but they had no money, so they sold the only ox they had and gave the money to the church. This spring they are pulling the plow themselves."

The husband and wife were silent. Then the wife said, "That was a real sacrifice."

"They did not call it that," said the missionary. "They thought it was fortunate they had an ox to sell."

The two tourists had little to say, but, when they reached home, they took the photograph to the church and told their pastor about the incident. "We want to double our pledge to the church," they said, "and give us some plow work to do. We never knew what gratitude or joy or sacrifice really meant until now."

God spoke to this couple through their experience in Korea about the joy that comes from giving. In his Word, God speaks to all of us about the importance of giving. Jesus said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35). He also said, "Freely you have received, freely give." (Matthew 10:8). If we choose not to give faithfully and generously, we forego the blessings that God gives to those who give cheerfully. There is no better time than now to examine your level of giving, and, if need be, to take a leap of faith and increase your giving. In the words of Winston Churchill, "We make a living by what we get; we make a life by what we give."


